A major advantage of an electronic medium is that it allows for a continuation of discussion, and so the group of papers on the Statesman in the previous issue have led to three more in this one: by Mary Louise Gill (Brown University), Dimitri El Murr (a response to Gill's paper, Université Paris I Panthéon-Sorbonne and Durham University), and Xavier Marquez (University of Notre Dame). Also, Kenneth Sayre is posting an update of "Appendix A, on Equivalents for the Great and the Small in Aristotle and his Commentators," from his contribution on the Statesman to Plato 5. At this point further suggestions and updates are invited, and can be submitted either to Kenneth Sayre directly (Sayre.1@nd.edu) or through the journal (Gretchen.J.Reydams-Schils.1@nd.edu). In addition, Plato 6 contains contributions on Plato's psychology, by Olivier Renaut (Université Paris I Panthéon-Sorbonne), on the Menexenus, by Etienne Helmer (Lycée Louise Weiss), and on the legacy of the Timaeus in Maximus the Confessor, by Pascal Mueller-Jpurdan (Université de Fribourg). Plato 6 concludes with three book reviews, by Morgan Gaulin (Université de Montréal), Eduardo Mombello (Universidad Nacional del Comahue), and Megan Halteman Zwart (University of Notre Dame).

All submissions are refereed (anonymously) by expert readers, including a native or fluent speaker of the language of the article.
